Timber's request for a permit. Not one single person spoke in favor of the plan proposed by the company and essentially approved by the US-ACOE and the W-DNR. According to the extensive number of documents, about 16.25 acres will be filled in to accommodate a trans-load/processing site for Meteor Timber. Sand will come from a mine located in Jackson County which is about 14 miles away. It is expected there will be numerous and hazardous traffic possibilities as it passes through congested areas and Millston.
